

What a wonderful start to 3YO kindergarten at Highmount Preschool!

We are so happy to see the children settling into the kindergarten routine and environment. We commenced the school year with shortened sessions for the first two weeks which proved effective as some children had never attended any forms of care before.

Each child is a unique individual and the educators and myself are supporting and empowering the children to follow their own interests, to play, learn, grow and develop at their own pace.

Our focus in Term 1 has been to establish secure and trusting relationships and to promote social and emotional wellbeing. They have gradually developed their sense of belonging through accessing their schoolbags, lunch boxes, drink bottles whenever required, and to confidently engage in kindergarten activities.









Each child is a unique individual and has their own interpretation of their own identity.



To further support and to build strong, trusting relationships, and to acknowledge each child's unique identity, children had the opportunity to draw their self-portrait. The activity involved looking at themselves in the mirror and to draw themselves by using different colours, shapes, lines.



We also celebrated Lunar New Year through books, discussions and artwork to show an appreciation for and curiosity about the world, its cultures and the diversity of its people.









To promote children's communication skills, children have been given the opportunity to share their '*All about me*' form with the group. They children were happy and enthusiastic to share their interests and skills with the kindergarten group.



Water play has been very popular in both the indoor and outdoor environments. Children have been experimenting with everyday objects in the water tub, washing babies and measuring. To further extend children's learning we set up a science experiment asking children to investigate and make predictions on whether an object will float or sink which promoted conversation and discussion amongst themselves and educators.











To extend the children's interest in cooking, we provided real cooking experiences for the children. Children have the opportunity to discuss different foods, textures and smells and what kind of food they like and dislike.





Following individual and group's interests in colours, we set up watercolour painting for the children to experiment with colour mixing and to discuss the shades of different colours.

At group times, we acknowledge the traditional land through singing 'Care for country' song. We also sing the 'Hello' song to acknowledge each member of kinder and make everyone feel special and welcomed. We use visuals 'Whole body listening' to show children the expectations on the mat. We enhance literacy and numeracy and other learning through action songs, interactive books, games, discussions and music movement. All children engage with group times in their own ways of listening and responding.









Incursion-African Drumming

We had the Rhythm of Life African drumming incursion on Tuesday 19 March. The incursion was led by Mohamed Camara from Guinea, West Africa who led the children on a journey of music, sounds, beats and patterns, dancing and folk tales from Africa. The children had opportunities to play the drums themselves after the demonstration. which they throughly enjoyed.

Last but not least, thank you to all parents for spending their time to help kinder in different forms, such as reading books with children, helping for the art activities, fixing water trolley, fixing bag hook or simply just having a chat with educators.

Throughout Term 1, the Silver Banksia children have been thriving in their learning and development as they make sense of the world and themselves through relationships and play. Through real and imagined cooking experiences, engaging with texts, and sharing our own cultural and family experiences of food we have discovered how food brings people together in celebration, connection, and shared rituals and traditions. This has led us to planning a special 4YO community event where the children will plan and deliver a social event based around the idea of coming together with our parents/carers around 'our table'. So far, the children have designed the table settings and created a menu that includes fruit skewers, sausages, and dip and veggies.



By supporting and encouraging children to plan all aspects of the event and implement it, we are hoping to strengthen their sense of agency and promote a positive sense of self as they see themselves as capable individuals. This event will be taking place at 1:30 pm, March 28th. It will be a wonderful opportunity to come together for connection, community, and celebration. We cannot wait to share this special event with our community of families.

Recently we are also celebrated Harmony Week by inviting the children to wear a touch of orange or traditional cultural dress to recognise and honour our culturally diverse and unique community that makes Highmount Preschool so special. Throughout the day we shared stories, songs, and food from diverse cultures as we celebrated the value and beauty of diversity. Harmony Day also offered us a meaningful context to introduce our new approach Acknowledging Country. Our Acknowledgement of Country will now change each day and children and teachers will be invited to lead the Acknowledgement so that it remains authentic, meaningful, and relevant to our community. To introduce this new approach to the children I used 3 fallen gum leaves, a fallen piece of bark from a manna gum, and a fallen flower from a flowering gum to represent connection to country and represent the beauty of diversity through the offerings of a gum tree. Our amazing continent boasts between 700 and 800 eucalypt species, making the gum tree the perfect symbol of diversity and Country.

Another wonderful outcome of the day came from gold coin donations from our Silver Banksia families. We raised \$26 which will be used to purchase a new anti-bias picture book. The children are currently in the process of selecting the text themselves. This is being achieved through looking at possible books that they think would be best for community and then taking a democratic vote to make the final decision. We will also invite the children to think critically about the resource they have chosen and why they think it will benefit our community. It is here that we can touch on social justice, fairness, equity and social responsibility.



As they have engaged in this process the children have worked with mathematical concepts and strengthened their emerging numeracy skills and knowledge as they counted the money and worked out what can be purchased with the money raised. This real-life opportunity to learn about money has made learning more meaningful and authentic and supported the children to take on a role of responsibility.

Throughout the Term, construction play has provided a meaningful context in which to develop key dispositions and skills for learning such cooperation, creativity, curiosity, experimentation, and persistence. Recently, the children have engaged in a diverse range of construction experiences from loose parts play to Duplo construction and big block play. Loose parts play invited the children to imagine, experiment and create with a wide variety of resources. String has provided a valuable complication to the construction process, and invited the children to think creatively and dynamically, while also challenging their fine motor skills. Looking ahead to next Term, we have asked our parent/carer group to support us with a possible carpentry or construction for a woodworking project. We believe it would provide a valuable and meaningful learning experience to have them collaborate on a project using real tools and materials.

Art mediums and mark making experiences continue to inspire the children to express themselves and communicate their ideas, understandings, and narratives. Whether they are creating an information text about volcanoes or experimenting with rollers and sponges, multimodal communication continues to occur, and skills and dispositions are being cultivated and strengthened. Perhaps the most important thing that we are seeing is the children grow in confidence and efficacy as communicators and strengthening their sense of identity as they explore and expand their self-concept through art mediums and storytelling.

With deepest gratitude, Bec, Hilda, Stephanie and Maddi We have continued to explore and investigate and the natural world! From the discovery of a possum sitting outside our possum box and a bird's nest in one of our tall trees, to caring for our two snails (Skye and Chase), our praying mantis (Cupcake), and our spiny leaf insect (Rosie). These experiences helped us to learn about the world around us, explore local biodiversity, and develop our sense of kindship for the natural world. To continue to support the children to learn in, with, for, about and from nature, we are purchasing a butterfly hatching kit with two chrysalises and also a hooded katydid and a male spiny leaf insect. These will help the children to learn about biodiversity and lifecycles and develop a sense of responsibility as we learn to care for these insects.

It has been a fruitful and fun first Term spent learning alongside one another and we cannot wait to see what wonderful happenings and opportunities that Term 2 has in store for us.
